2020 REVENUES

In 2020, more than 2/3 of Canadian charities reported a decline in donations*, so we were pleased that your gifts last year were comparable to what you gave in 2019. Much of our annual revenue comes from child sponsorships, so thank you for keeping your commitment to the children you support! To diversify revenue, we applied for more grants and launched the Champions program, the Youth Ambassador program, and the Group Empowerment program. We pray that these new streams will bear much fruit in the years to come.



OVERHEAD EXPENSES

Just like for-profit businesses, charities have to pay salaries, rent, insurance, printing, promotion, and many other expenses. These administrative and fundraising costs are necessary (the children's programs wouldn't exist without funding). Of course, we always do our best to minimize how much we spend, and we were blessed again in 2020 to receive enough funds from some generous donors to pay all the overhead. This means all the gifts above, including yours, were sent to the projects and programs.

PRACTICAL SUPPORT

- Sent aid, personnel, and other resources to areas in need
- Implemented food security and health programs for sponsored children
- Communicated by mobile phone with caregivers and children
- Encouraged children to continue their studies at home
- Paid special attention to drop-incentre kids, the most vulnerable in Bangladesh
- Worked to prevent domestic violence, physical abuse, and psychological trauma during lockdown
- Distributed 1000s of food packages to families inside and outside the school communities

Colombia

- » At-home learning Rose of Sharon School gave out weekly materials, sim cards and tablets so kids could complete their studies at home.
- » Graduation 15 students finished high school with a small and simple ceremony; they are now looking forward to having access to college.
- » Community outreach a daily evangelism program was delivered to the community via Facebook live and Zoom to make known the love of God.
- » Food relief was distributed to families near the Mallorquín Swampland affected by heavy rains.
- » Hurricane relief Provided medicine, shelters, healthcare, emotional therapy, and recreational activities for children after Hurricane Iota battered San Andres and destroyed 80% of Providencia, leaving hundreds of families homeless.

PRAYER REQUEST

We begin a new year, 2021, with great challenges. Companies are working at a slow pace, businesses are closing, government measures and curfews are strong. Two pastors, members of our council, died from COVID-19. We ask for God's protection over the school, church and community.



CLINIQUE PAPILLON (MATERNITY CLINIC)

- » Economic paralysis hit the city of Lubumbashi in 2020, with an estimated 80% of the population unable to earn enough money for food and medical bills. Some used clothes and dishes to pay for their medical care!
- » Loving service Despite immense financial pressures and soaring prices, the clinic served 600 patients a month (pregnant women, children, babies, and seniors), and delivered 75-80 babies each month.
- » Pregnancy care The clinic received six young girls who became pregnant because there was no school, including one who had been raped.
- » A new ambulance was put into service and quickly resulted in many saved lives.
- » Ministry to moms with HIV AIDS In addition to antiretroviral medicines, the clinic provided moral, psychological, and sometimes financial support to mothers with HIV AIDS.
- » Clinique Papillon was chosen by the government as the official centre in Lubumbashi for vaccinations and HIV care because of their highly qualified staff, abundance of water, mosquito nets, and excellent patient care.

EPHPHATA SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF

The solar panels at the school are working very well, and fundraising for the third phase of panels is underway. The carpentry program is progressing well. Funds were sent for tools and machinery at the end of the year.



Ghana HIGHLIGHTS

- » Despite the pandemic, International Needs Ghana was able to reach more than 60,000 people through education, child rights, gender and empowerment, health, and Christian witness programs.
- » **5000 children** had access to education, school feeding, WASH (*water, sanitation and hygiene*), and evangelism / discipleship support.
- » 15 Community Child Protection Committees (CCPCs) were established and operated through COVID.
- » The community of Nanankor came together with Women Making a Difference to finish the first phase of the Safe Water project, and begin plans for Phase 2. Men and women from the community were involved in the decision-making process.
- » The team launched community-based reading clinics for children, distributed COVID relief to impoverished communities, and gave out Dignity Kits (three months' supply of sanitary pads and soap) to 6,700 adolescent girls.

Guatemala

Our partner in Guatemala worked hard in 2020, determined to carry on through the pandemic. Despite decades of international aid, maternal and child mortality is still at an unacceptable level throughout Guatemala. Midwives attend more than 90% of births in the rural areas, and a significant number of deaths are connected to a lack of their knowledge in recognizing and handling high-risk pregnancies.

After making some safety modifications for COVID, the team launched their midwife training program in the Paquip region. Rather than hosting a full class of 40, the facilitators delivered the program in multiple locations, with just 5-6 midwives per class. The women have been engaged and responsive to the material, and the registered nurse who delivers the program is confident that the midwives are being transformed by the experience.

International Needs Canada visited Guatemala in January 2020, shortly before the pandemic struck, so it's very encouraging that the launch went ahead as planned. The program is a collaborative effort between Rotary Canada, Rotary Guatemala, UNAPER (a group of neonatal physicians in Guatemala), and International Needs Canada.

Two lives saved! "One of the midwives from our training program recently discovered that a pregnant woman under her care had critically high blood pressure. The mother was transferred from her rural village to hospital in Guatemala City, where she received an emergency C-section. Thanks to education and equipment, both mum and baby survived!" • INGRID FIGUEROA, COUNTRY DIRECTOR



Kenya

- » Kenya experienced a sharp increase in sexual abuse, teenage pregnancies, alcoholism, drug abuse, and crime during the pandemic. To support the children through the pandemic, International Needs Kenya provided proactive nutritional, educational, moral, medical, and psychosocial support.
- » They launched a Virtual Learning Program (VLP), Mental Health Program, and Teen Sessions.
- » They hosted a meeting to encourage parents and caregivers to stay vigilant and provide moral support to their children.
- » In Kibera slum, the Youth Entrepreneurship Mentorship Project continued, along with Bible Clubs for younger children and the Vertical Gardening initiative to enhance food security.
- The Home Visit Program resumed with strict observance of health protocols. It became apparent that many first-born children are playing the role of parent, despite their tender ages.
- » In Kawangware slum, The Real Hope Youth Community Organization was busy with food distribution, water supply, and reaching out to the elderly.
- » RHYCO also relocated their drop-in centre and opened a safe house to rescue children who had been abused, often by relatives and people close to them.



- » During the pandemic, sponsored children in Nepal were "scattered throughout the country from east to west." International Needs Nepal contacted the children and families frequently to motivate them to study, and annual exam failures decreased to nearly zero!
- » Many food baskets, relief supplies, and financial support were sent to the sponsored children and their families.
- » The Lydia Vocational Centre was closed much of the year, but the team provided remote support for their students.
- » They also helped some of their graduates (many of whom are now entrepreneurs) in their new business ventures.





Uganda

- » Utilized technology as much as possible to visit sponsored children and monitor their well-being.
- » Distributed food packages to needy families and employees.
- » Provided nutritional and psychosocial support to children infected or affected by HIV/AIDS.
- » Helped 203 sponsored children and 1 parent who was HIV positive access medical services at our partner health facilities.
- » **Provided online counselling services** for bereaved children and families who were struggling with the loss of loved ones.
- » Supported 17 churches to reopen with personal protective supplies, such as hand washing stations, thermometer guns, and sanitizers.
- » Distributed educational materials from the government to allow 2000 children to learn at home.

IMPACT STORY – A FAMILY TRANSFORMED BY SPONSORSHIP

Sarah, a sponsored child, has always received additional gift money from her sponsor. With guidance from International Needs, her mother purchased a cow that has since birthed two calves. She sold the milk and the original cow, started a pig project, and built a permanent kitchen. The family now has two sources of income to meet the children's schooling costs and the basic needs of the family.

Zambia

ZACTS AND EMELE SCHOOLS

- » Distributed food baskets to almost 200 sponsored children and their families
- » Purchased and installed 10 computers
- » Began construction on a new classroom to handle the rapidly expanding student population
- » Scored 100% pass rate at grade 7 level

ZACTS FARM PROJECT

- » Grew and harvested 100s of bags of green and white maize to help the school reduce feeding program costs.
- » Poultry and rabbit programs continued, with a goal of generating income.
- Funds have been raised to purchase a new tractor and a new truck for the farm. This equipment will allow the farm to be more efficient and scale up production.
