Equipping Students to Thrive:The Ephphata School Agricultural Project



Founded in 1983, the Ephphata School brings hope to deaf and hard of hearing children in Lubumbashi, DRC. In a society where disabilities are often misunderstood or stigmatized, families with limited resources often prioritize their other children, leaving many deaf and hard of hearing children without access to education.

Ephphata is changing this reality. Today, more than 250 students are enrolled. The school now has multiple classrooms, vocational workshops in carpentry and sewing, a dormitory for students who live too far away to commute, and farmland to help sustain its needs.


So far, only a small portion of this land has been cultivated.

Now, Ephphata is ready to expand its agricultural work and make greater use of this valuable resource. The expansion is guided by several key goals:

- **Improving Nutrition**: Integrating more vegetables into student meals so they stay healthy and focused in class.
- **Enhancing Education:** Introducing hands-on agricultural learning for older students.
- Strengthening Food Security: Reducing dependence on outside sources through a reliable food supply.
- **Boosting Financial Stability:** Selling a portion of the harvest to support the school's operations.

This project will provide a new well for irrigation, essential farming equipment, and wages for three workers. The school will grow a variety of vegetables, including cabbage, tomatoes, okra, peppers, amaranth, eggplant, onions, and potatoes.

Thanks to funds already raised, much of what is needed for this project is in place. With just \$14,000 left to go, your support will strengthen food security, health, and education for Ephphata's students, helping them grow and reach their full potential.



Growing Strong in Guatemala: Kimberly's Bright Future

In rural Guatemala, many children grow up without access to early education, and poor nutrition often limits their development and future opportunities. Chronic malnutrition is a constant challenge in these communities, affecting not only children's physical growth but also their brain development and ability to learn. **But exciting change is taking place in the community of Paley.**



Thanks to your support, the Survive and Thrive program is breaking these cycles by laying strong foundations for learning and health from the very beginning. Each week, young children take part in interactive learning sessions that build skills for school and healthy development, while mothers attend nutrition workshops and cooking classes. Families learn how to prepare affordable, nutritious meals using local ingredients, giving them practical tools they can use every day.

Four-year old Kimberly is a shining example of the impact this program is having. When she joined last year, she was severely malnourished. Most of her meals were candy and chips, and she wasn't getting the nutrients her body needed to grow. After attending the workshops, her mother learned how the foods we eat can either support or hinder long-term development, and she began making nutritious meals at home.

Kimberly also receives Chispuditos, a special meal supplement for children under five. It's full of vitamins and minerals that help her grow, strengthen her immune system, and support her brain development. Today, she's healthier, more energetic, and ready for the future.

After a session on gardening in class, Mahi received seeds to grow pumpkin, gourd, and cabbage. She brought them home, and the whole family planted the seeds in every unused space around their home the very same day. Over the next few months, their garden flourished, providing fresh vegetables for the family.

Those simple seeds sparked change that reaches far beyond the classroom. Mahi gained practical skills and confidence, her family's nutrition and health improved, and the entire household came together around a shared project. This is the power of community-focused giving. One educational opportunity can create lasting impact, strengthen families, develop skills, and transform entire communities.

Walk for Water 2025:

Clean Water through Community Action



Introduced in 2023, the Walk for Water fundraiser has quickly become an annual summer tradition! This year, the first walk took place in Ontario, organized by advocates at Women Making a Difference, and the second walk was held in Alberta, organized by Bonavista Church.

The goal of the walks was to raise enough funds to provide one community with two boreholes, five latrines, and five handwashing stations. Thanks to the dedication of walkers and supporters, the events raised an incredible \$57,000, enough to complete this work in one community and nearly cover the full amount needed for a second!

With these funds, the villages of Ziasso and Mana will soon have access to clean water and proper sanitation, transforming the lives of families who have long faced daily struggles without safe water.

These walks highlight the dedication of Canadian leaders and advocates, and show how the support of people like you can create real, lasting change. While we celebrate this success, we are excited to keep the momentum going and reach even more communities in need of clean water.

Access to clean water is well known to reduce water-borne illnesses and help communities thrive, but it also has a direct impact on nutrition. When a borehole is installed, our partners pair it with a small platform to manage runoff. This platform collects excess water, which can then be safely directed into troughs, providing a reliable water source for livestock. This not only reduces water waste but also keeps livestock healthy, boosting food security and overall health!
